Il Fornaio (www.ilfornaio.com)

This is an Italian chain restaurant with a branch in the conference hotel. It's fun and the food is OK. They periodically feature food and wine from a single region of Italy, which is always more interesting than the regular menu. Sunday night is the last night for the Trentino regional menu.

La Pastaia (http://www.lapastaia.com/)

My favorite Italian restaurant in downtown, located in a nicely restored Art Deco hotel on Santa Clara Street. Hearty, tasty, often wonderful food in an elegant but not stuffy venue. There's also a great bar, the Hedley Club, which will have live jazz Saturday night if you arrive early.

Arcadia (http://www.sanjosemarriott.com/fs-arcadia.php)

A Michael Mina restaurant in the Marriott Hotel across the street from the Sainte Claire. A destination restaurant with a casual atmosphere. The lobster pot pie and the whole (deep) fried chicken are fabulous, and the rest of the menu is always interesting.

The Grill on the Alley (http://www.thegrill.com/location677d.html)

An upscale steakhouse in the Fairmont Hotel, a block north of the Sainte Claire. Giant slabs of protein, other good stuff, perhaps the best martini bar in San Jose, two waitpersons per table. Not cheap.

Picasso's Tapas (http://www.picassostapas.com/)

62 W. Santa Clara Street, three blocks north and half a block east of the Sainte Claire. Tapas, paella, great sangria. They also have entrees but I've never tried them. A fun place, especially for a group.

Eulipia (http://www.zagat.com/r/eulipia-restaurant-bar-san-jose/menu#name-anchor)

374 S. 1st Street, a block east and half a block south of the Sainte Claire. This is the place that started the restaurant revival in downtown San Jose. American comfort food, quite reasonably priced, very friendly and casual service. Closed Monday.

Poor House Bistro (http://www.poorhousebistro.com/)

91 S. Autumn Street, two blocks north from the hotel to San Fernando, then seven blocks west. Authentic New Orleans food in an old house, order inside and take it outside. Po boys, muffalettas, jambalaya, gumbo; New Orleans beer; inexpensive. Don't go Saturday or Wednesday night before 7:30, since it will be full of Sharks fans.

Naglee Park Garage (http://www.nagleeparkgarage.com/)

505 E. San Carlos Street, 11 blocks east of the hotel. Neighborhood bistro actually located in a former garage, really good food, inexpensive. Closed Monday.

Henry's World Famous High Life (http://www.henryshilife.com/)

301 W. St. John Street, one block west from the hotel, then five blocks north on Almaden (use the west side of the street) and under the freeway. A San Jose institution since 1960. BBQ ribs and chicken, grilled steaks, 15 beers on tap. Exceptionally casual. If you're lucky, the waitress will call you Honey. Also a pre-Sharks hangout, so Saturday and Wednesday nights will be crowded before 7:30.



Gordon Biersch Brewery Restaurant (http://www.gordonbiersch.com/)

33 East San Fernando Street, two blocks north from the hotel, then a block and a half east. The second Gordon Biersch in the world and (I think) the first brew pub in San Jose. Dan Gordon was the first American to graduate from the brewing program at the Technische Hochschule Munchen. Great beer, potent garlic fries, upscale bar food.

Mezcal (http://mezcalrestaurantsj.com/)

25 W. San Fernando Street, two blocks north from the hotel and half a block east. Oaxacan regional Mexican food (you can get fried grasshoppers), specializing in moles. Wide selection of Mezcals, similar to tequila but with fewer restrictions of what kind of agave can be used to make the fermenting mash.

Azucar Latin Bistro and Mojito Bar (http://www.azucarsj.com/)

71 E. San Fernando Street, two blocks north from the hotel and two and a half blocks east. Tapas, fajitas, fish, tri-tip. Mexican, Peruvian, Cuban, Argentinian influences.

Nazca Peruvian Cuisine (http://www.nazcaperuviancuisine.com/)

167 W. San Fernando Street, two blocks north from the hotel and one and a half blocks west. Seafood and ceviches, chicken, meat, vegetarian; interesting appetizer selection (grilled cow heart, octopus several ways). Closed Monday.

Tofoo Com Chay

388 E. Santa Clara Street, three blocks north and nine blocks east from the hotel. Vietnamese vegetarian food, very tasty but very small. Very inexpensive.

Paesano (408.217.9327)

350 W. Julian Street, six blocks north and four blocks west (under the freeway) from the hotel. Relatively new Italian restaurant in a remodeled house, gets crowded so reservations recommended.

Non-food things

Sharks play Saturday (St. Louis, 7:30) and Wednesday (Calgary, 7:00). Great fun if you enjoy large men doing ballet-like things with knives strapped to their feet. Tickets available on the Sharks site or Stubhub.

If you're a runner or a walker, the Guadalupe River Trail is two and a half blocks west of the hotel. Eleven miles or so (each way) of paved or gravel trail, takes you all the way to the Bay. Get in most of a marathon before breakfast.

Peralta Adobe & Fallon House (0.6 mi)

The Peralta Adobe, originally built in 1797, is the last remaining structure from El Pueblo de San Jose de Guadalupe, California's very first settlement. The Fallon House, a 15-room Victorian Mansion built by an early San Jose mayor is tucked around the corner from the many fine restaurants on downtown San Jose's San Pedro Square. These two well-preserved original buildings represent a piece of California history and offer a quiet retreat from the hi-tech hi-rises of downtown San Jose.

Come visit San Jose's most famous tourist attraction! In 1884, a wealthy widow named Sarah L. Winchester began a huge construction project that took the next 38 years to build. The Victorian mansion, designed and built by the Winchester Rifle heiress, is filled with so many unexplained oddities, that it has come to be known as the Winchester Mystery House. There are windows built into the floor, staircases that lead to nowhere and doors that open onto blank walls. With 4 stories, 47 fireplaces, 17 chimneys, and 950 doors, the guided tours can be quite amazing.
